SERVING ON THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF TVEC? I am interested in serving the board of directors at TVEC to broaden my knowledge of how our electric co-op works. I have been a customer for approximately 21 years and I'm not as familiar with how the process and electrical service works as I feel I should be. I am also interested in meeting new people from our area. Labette County has some great people and I am always excited to meet new folks and become more well versed.

WHAT QUALITIES AND/OR PAST **EXPERIENCE DO YOU HAVE THAT** WOULD MAKE YOU A GOOD DIRECTOR?

I feel that my 20-plus years as a purchasing and facilities manager at my current employer would truly help in making good decisions for TVEC. I am responsible for bringing in all raw materials to keep the plant going, as well as heavily involved in all maintenance decisions. I have an engineering background as well as good mechanical skills that will aid in this position. I don't feel that school teaches you everything you need to be successful in a career, but I also have a bachelor's degree from Pitt State in plastic engineering.

WHAT WOULD YOU LIKE TO SEE TVEC **FOCUS ON IN THE NEXT FEW YEARS?**

From my perspective and current home address, I don't have any immediate concerns. In my first few years here, I do feel like we had more frequent power outages and flickering, but as of late and over the last few years, I honestly feel like this has improved. For looking down the road, I would want to focus on keeping the power on for everyone with minimal down time. If we could look at any improvements that would allow some redundancy and less down time, that would be a great place to start. It also goes without saying, but any cost reductions that could be passed down to the customer would certainly be appreciated as well.

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CEO Report



ANGIE ERICKSON CEO

We hope you will consider attending our annual meeting this year. In addition to the meal and various reports, members in attendance will

elect fellow members to represent them on the TVEC Board of Directors. Two current directors have decided not to run for re-election this year. Thank you **DAVID HUBBELL** and JARED NASH for your service to the cooperative! This publication contains information on the candidates running for board positions.

The financial report for 2024 is also in this publication. We ended the year with a positive net margin, although lower than typical. Sales in kilowatt-hours for 2024 were the lowest in seven years, mostly due to mild weather.

In 2024, we continued to invest in our electrical system. Replacement of old poles and conductor, system improvements and line clearance efforts all ensure the reliability of our system. Once again, this work was done without any significant injuries.

As TVEC employees, we do the best we can to serve the membership by working safely and efficiently to provide reliable power to our members.

President's Report

The electric industry continues to struggle to find its direction.

A year ago, big plans were being made to expand renewable generation in the Midwest, with discussions of green hydrogen production, battery manufacturing and crosscountry, multistate transmission lines constructed to move electricity east to Chicago and other major cities. Today, many of these plans are on hold or at least have lost their glitter.

The business of providing reliable electricity continues to roll along. Several big, commercial solar power installations that have been in the works for some time will probably get completed. No new coal-powered plants have been built in about 10 years, and the ones in operation are still headed for retirement. A few summer and winter extremes in the last few years have demonstrated that wind and solar generation can reduce carbon dioxide emissions, but they can't be trusted to be operational at peak demand times. That leaves natural gas generation to pick up the slack. Evergy is currently planning to add two 700 megawatt combined cycle natural gas plants to their generation fleet in Kansas. Other utilities across the Midwest will likely be making similar plans as their coal plants retire in the coming years.

All of this generation is hooked

together by the transmission system. About 15 years ago, regional transmission operators were formed. Nearly 20 independent generation and transmission utilities formed the

Southwest Power Pool (SPP). SPP doesn't own the generation or transmission assets, but it manages the generator outputs and transmission lines so that, collectively, we have the cheapest, most reliable electricity. I'm sure it is a bigger job than it seems — conventional power plants online or out for maintenance, transmission lines in service or damaged, intermittent renewables generating at continuously varying levels or not at all, and the load changing continuously with the weather and the time of day.

It takes a lot of planning and a large investment for the power to be on tomorrow, next month, and future years. The SPP does the transmission planning, while the generation-owning utilities plan for their customers' generation capacity needs. Local distribution providers, like Twin Valley Electric co-op, plan for the final delivery system so residential, commercial and industrial electricity users can continue to expect reliable service.


